*** KAREN GAME** R.I.P.

It is with deepest sorrow that we have to inform members of the passing of League member Karen Game.

Karen was a generous, larger than life person, with pink hair and flamboyant style of dressing. She was a regular tournament player until Covid. She had been in poor health for a while but became ill with a chest infection and had been in hospital for about a month. She was getting better and finally was allowed home. However, she became very ill again, paramedics were called but their efforts were in vain. Karen passed away at home on the morning of 4th January.

She would have been 64 in July.

In 1998 she featured in the furthest London League fixture outside London. Karen, Phyllis Fernandez, Alison Stilwell and Richard Woodward played two official League matches in a rented cottage in Sinalunga, Italy.

In the LSL summer season of April-September 2010 Karen won a gold scroll for the highest scoring word of the season. QUAINTER for 194.

In 2008 at the Northwood Tournament she won the Graeme Thomas Memorial Trophy for the closest word associated with Graeme: SIBLING. (Graeme had a twin brother).

Then at New Malden in June 2012 she won the Ron Hendra Memorial Trophy for the best performing London League player at that tournament.

"Karen has been struggling with her mobility and health for many months and has been in and out of hospital for tests and blood transfusions. She was still managing to play most of her games (and well).

Certainly pre Covid, Karen was always very kind to others in need, including going out of her way to be able to offer lifts to tournaments to others, and visiting those in hospital. One particular occasion sticks in my mind. This was when another Scrabbler died (the person was very dear to me). Driving was hard for me at that time. The woodland funeral was held in Brighton, with just me and the celebrant scheduled to attend. I mentioned it to Karen and she immediately said she would come, and along with another LSL member, she drove us down. It was a sunny day, and we gave our friend a good send off, then had a cheery pub lunch.

Let's hope many of us will be able to give her husband Bobby our support in giving Karen a worthy send off. Rest in peace Karen."
