## **BRIAN SUGAR R.I.P.**

Probably only a few of you will recognise the name of Brian Sugar. It comes with great sadness to inform members that Brian, a long-standing Scrabble player for many decades, passed away on 2<sup>nd</sup> November 2023. He had only just turned 70 in October.

Brian was a member of the London League up until the late 1980s. He was one of the earliest advocates of match-play (play-to-win) Scrabble in the UK, at a time when the collusive "high score" format was in full swing. He was, along with a few others, instrumental in setting up the ABSP (then called the APSP) in 1987.

He won the Reg Lever Cup (1980 and 1982), the John Meikle Cup (1984) and The Pinner Tournament in 1996. He held many roles within the League. He ran Sunday Drives, he produced the monthly fixtures, by hand without the aid of computers, organised and posted the monthly mailing to members (even hand delivered some of them), edited 10

issues of the monthly newsletter in 1986, and was Treasurer at some point too. He was also the New Members Liaison Officer which often included current members in the vetting of new members.

He had largely disappeared from the Scrabble scene in the past decade with very occasional appearances at the Ilford Tournament.
